♦ Vision

We have written out an explicit vision for the *Yearbook*. We are looking for long-form pieces that challenge the discipline to see itself in more expansive ways. We are especially looking for pieces that take inclusive approaches to bioanthropological scholarship (pieces that are intersectional in terms of the questions asked, interpretive frameworks engaged, and theoretical orientations reflected). Finally, we are looking for pieces that are transformational for the ethical and equitable practice of Biological Anthropology.

We have been soliciting pieces and making collective editorial decisions, based on this vision.

• Editorial Board Structure

We expanded the editorial board to include a mix of early- and advanced-career scholars. We have paired early-advanced scholars according to broad research specialties (human biology, paleoanthropology, primatology, bioarchaeology, forensic anthropology, genomic anthropology, and ethics).
