Introduction

The Vice President chairs the Program Committee and coordinates AABA programming throughout the year. In 2024-2025, this centered on organizing the 94th Annual Meeting in Baltimore, Maryland. This is the first* time that AABA has held a conference in Baltimore, and the first time the meetings have been on the East Coast in decades.

Tasks related to organizing the annual conference included program committee formation, symposium proposal review, abstract submission review and notification, workshop proposal review, scheduling the conference events, publication of the annual abstract volume, and publication of the conference program.

The 2025 conference is in-person with select virtual components. Online presenters have the opportunity to present in an asynchronous online format. The Invited Podium Symposia, Business Meeting, Presidential Plenary, and select workshops will be livestreamed and recorded. New this year in the program are the Presidential Plenary on Thursday morning featuring the President-Elect, Anne Stone, and a Late Breaking Science poster session on Saturday afternoon. The Plenary is scheduled so that the entire membership can attend and enjoy a light breakfast. The Late Breaking Science session was designed to encourage additional submissions closer to the meeting, and submission deadline was in February. The session was limited to 40 posters by authors who were not already first-authors accepted in the first submission round.

Program Committee

A call for program committee volunteers was distributed to AABA members in April 2024 with a deadline to apply by July 1, 2024. Eligible regular members applied by web form. The program committee includes 55 members, a mix of returning and new members. The committee includes members from a range of career stages and international institutions. 24 members of the Program Committee took on the task of organizing the contributed sessions, and 23 reviewers volunteered to review for the Late Breaking Science session. Webinars

With the development of the new AABA website and the transition to X-CD for abstract submission, membership, and conference coordination, it was decided that we would take a hiatus from scheduled webinars. Future plans include short teaching and research video highlights behind the member paywall on the AABA website.

Invited Symposia

Proposals for invited symposia were due on August 15, 2025. The Program Committee received 20 invited symposium proposals, which were reviewed by both the Program Committee and the Executive Committee; 12 proposals were accepted and one organizer declined. Accepted proposals include 6 podium and 5 poster symposia.

Abstract Submission and Review

Abstract submission

The abstract submission portal was opened on September 15, 2024. Abstracts for the 2025 annual meeting were due October 15, 2024. A total of 755 abstracts were submitted during the first round of submissions, which is on par with the abstract submissions for the 2023 and 2024 annual meetings. However, these metrics still fall behind pre-pandemic counts by ~30% (e.g., there were 1121 abstract submissions in 2019).

At the time of abstract submission, authors could choose to present in-person or online only. Venue preferences for contributed abstracts at the time of submission were: in-person 99% and online 1%. Compared to 2023 and 2024, the interest in online only presentation has decreased from 11% of submissions to 4%, to 1%.

Abstract review

Abstracts were assigned to two members of the Program Committee for review with a review deadline of October 31, 2024. Abstracts with one or more recommendations to reject received an additional round of review. After this second round of review a total of 14 abstracts had received at least two recommendations to reject, and these were rejected. All of these abstracts were rejected on the basis of a lack of evidence of data analysis or results.

Authors of accepted abstracts were notified on December 16, 2024, following the advance team visit to Baltimore, MD, on December 6-7, 2024. Presentation schedules were included in this notification. Because of the transition to X-CD, some authors have indicated that they never received their abstract acceptance or rejection notifications. Next year, authors will be notified multiple times.

Workshop Proposals

We received 17 proposals for workshops by the November 15, 2024 deadline. This is fewer than we received for the 2024 meeting. Workshop proposals were evaluated by the chair of the Program Committee and the President. Save one proposal that was not in a workshop format, all workshop proposals were accepted and organizers were notified on January 15, 2025. Organizers for two similar workshops were asked if they would like to combine their programs, and they successfully did for a final total of 15 workshops.

Scientific Session Formation and Advance Team Visit

Scientific sessions were assembled by six subcommittees of the Program Committee (Bioarchaeology, Forensics, Dental & Education, Functional Anatomy & Genetics, Human Behavior & Biology, Primatology, and Paleoanthropology). Each subcommittee had 3-4 members (i.e., 24 members of the Program Committee were on subcommittees). Each subcommittee was tasked with grouping contributed abstracts into podium and poster sessions and assigning chairs to each session. The number of podium sessions per subject area was based on the proportion of abstracts in each subject area:

- Bioarchaeology = 4
- Dental Anthropology = 1
- Education in Biological Anthropology = half session
- Forensic Anthropology = 1
- Functional Anatomy/Tissue Biology = 2
- Genetics and Genomics = 2
- Human Behavior = half session
- Human Biology = 2
- Paleoanthropology = 3
- Primatology = 3

Subcommittees were given a month to complete this task, and all sessions were formed by December 4.

The AABA Advance Team visited the conference venue in Baltimore from December 6-7, 2024. The team included Lori Strong (Burk & Associates), Siobhan Cooke, Kristi Lewton, Stephanie Meredith, Kate Fish, and Amy L. Rector. Because the sessions were formed prior to the advance visit, the team focused on scheduling sessions (assigning sessions to rooms, days, and times) and entering the sessions into the AABA website on X-CD.

Late Breaking Science

A new initiative this year is the Late Breaking Science poster session scheduled for Saturday afternoon with a limited acceptance of 40 abstracts. The call for proposals was made on January 23 with a deadline of February 1, 2025. These abstracts were reviewed using the same procedure as the typical submission cycle by a subset of 23 volunteers of the Program Committee. The total number of abstracts submitted was 42, and 40 of these were accepted. Rejected abstracts were incomplete.

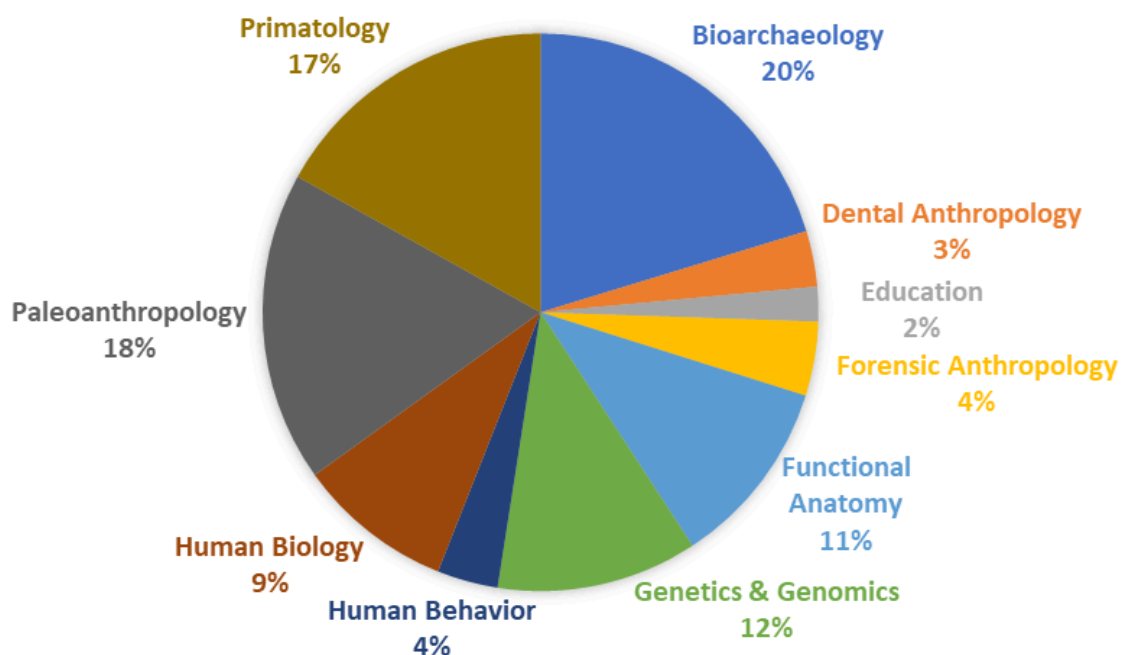
Abstracts

As of March 11, 2025, there are 647 contributed abstracts and 133 invited abstracts for a total of 780 abstracts, including the 40 Late Breaking Science submissions. The proportion of contributed abstracts by subfield are in Table 1 and Figure 1.

The abstract volume was submitted to Wiley on March 7, 2025. Downloading the abstracts from X-CD with formatting intact (especially italics) proved to be a challenge and will need to be rectified next year.

Meetings Program, Virtual Platform, and Accessibility

We are continuing to use the X-CD platform for sharing virtual components of the conference, including as a repository for uploaded asynchronous online presentations and recordings of live streamed sessions. These materials will be viewable through September for registered conference attendees.

The meetings program was finalized on February 21. The first draft of the full meetings program was published on the AABA website on February 21. Updates were published thereafter until the program was sent to the printer on March 3, 2025.

Following up on last year's efforts to increase accessibility of the annual AABA conference, we created a survey that accompanied abstract submission to query attendees on accommodation needs (e.g., oral presentation transcription, single level/no stairs). Of the surveys submitted by the abstract submission deadline, 0.6% requested an accommodation.

All podium presentations use voice-to-text transcription using Powerpoint subtitles and presenters have been reminded to use accessible fonts and color schemes. We have a quiet room with low lighting and reduced sensory stimulation, a Family and Lactation Respite Room, and access to a secure refrigerator for medications. The registration desk also has fidget spinners, eye masks, and ear plugs. All but one presentation room is setup as single-level, without stairs.

Meeting Registration

As of March 11, there are a total of 1,335 individuals registered for the 2025 annual meeting. International registrants from 46 countries make up 15% of meeting registrations, which is on par with meetings back to 2019 (Appendix 3).

I would like to thank the other officers and members of the AABA Executive Committee for all of their assistance as we transitioned to two new websites and systems this year. I also want to acknowledge all of our association members who tirelessly make available their wisdom, ideas, and excitement about their science as they share their results, workshops, and symposium proposals. This year's program is inspiring and I am immensely grateful to the 55 dedicated members of our Program Committee who conducted and completed symposium and abstract reviews thoughtfully, thoroughly, and expeditiously. Additional thanks go to the 24 members of the Program Committee who took on the task of organizing the contributed sessions, and to the 23 members who were additionally willing to very quickly and generously review the Late Breaking Science abstract submissions.

Many thanks to the Advance Team who met in Baltimore to set the schedule for the scientific program. Thank you to Lori Strong, Siobhan Cooke, Kristi Lewton, Stephanie Meredith, and Kate Fish for the time and effort spent brainstorming new ideas and opportunities for members.

Of course, none of the program organization in our new X-CD system would be possible without the immense efforts of Ed Hagen and Kristi L. Lewton, our website and abstract database developers. The Program Assistant Kate Fish has been a tremendous help and I am very grateful for her attention to detail and flexibility. I also want to thank the AABA Officers and members of the Executive Committee for their year-round hard work that makes our annual meeting possible.

I thank our partners from Burk & Associates, including Annual Meeting Executive Director Lori Strong, Heide Rohland, Mary Lou Scarborough, Brett Burk, Cooky Bysura, Jill Drupa, Amy Sullivan, Sean Sullivan, Raelene Sok, and Elizabeth Terry-Humen. This team helped with registrations, organizing student volunteers, sending emails to the membership, producing our printed materials, interfacing with the exhibitors, and assisting with every detail no matter how small.
