

Report for the 2025 AABA Business Meeting
Student Programs Committee
Kevin Hatala, 19, February 2025

The Student Programs Committee primarily implements two student competitions. The first occurs at the Annual Meeting, when students who present research in either a poster or podium format compete for eight Student Presentation Prizes. The second competition is for the Pollitzer Student Travel Awards, for which students write an essay on a topic chosen by the Executive Committee. In this report, I first summarize the student prizes awarded at the 2024 Annual Meeting. I then provide preliminary information on the 2025 Pollitzer Student Travel Awards.

I. 2024 Student Presentation Prizes

The 2024 AABA Student Presentation Awards followed the protocol used for the last several years. The number of student presentation prize applications decreased this year compared to last year (n=15 compared with n=30) and 27 judges were organized to evaluate these presentations.

II. 2024 Pollitzer Student Travel Awards

The Pollitzer Student Travel Awards are designed to help students defray the costs of attending the AABA meetings. They are named in honor of William S. Pollitzer, a Human Biologist who taught at University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill, a Darwin Lifetime Achievement Awardee, and past president of the AABA (AAPA). As of 2024, the award traditionally provides \$500 to each recipient to defray travel costs to attend AAPA’s annual meeting. The number of awards is also tied to proceeds from the auction at the prior year’s Annual Meeting.

This award is open to all AABA student members (undergraduate and graduate) who are attending the Annual Meeting. Students do not need to be giving a presentation to qualify but they do need to be a member of the AABA at the time of the meeting and should not have been granted their PhD prior to the submission deadline for 2024 the submission deadline was (January 6, 2024).

The essay question changes each year. Awards are made on the basis of an essay of no more than 750 words (excluding references). The specific prompt for 2024 was:

The role of artificial intelligence (AI) in research and education has been a subject of discussion recently as the scientific community grapples with the widespread use of, for example, large language models such as ChatGPT in the classroom. Can AI be used ethically and in a way that is beneficial for multiple communities? Are there ways that it should not be used? How should we as a community move forward with artificial intelligence (should we restrict its use, provide guidelines etc.)? In your essay be sure to provide examples and address the ethical considerations of using AI in the biological anthropology spheres you inhabit (e.g., teaching/education, research/scholarship).

The deadline for entry was January 6^h, midnight UTC -11 hours. The submission website went live in November 2023 and we received entries starting on the 4th of November through to the last few minutes before the deadline. We received 66 original essays, which were rated by a committee of 36 judges.

Evaluation was done on a 27-point scale based on a seven-part scale (5 points total for addressing each component of the essay question, 2 points for grammar and spelling, 2 points for overall writing and clarity, and 3 points for proper citation formatting). In an effort to standardize the scoring system, a rubric was utilized.

Each entry was given a number, and essays were identified only by number during the evaluation process. Each essay was scored by three judges. Each judge was asked to score ~6 essays and one back up judge was used for conflicts of interest. The final score for each essay was determined as the average of the three independent scores. Neither the named essays nor the number/name key was accessible at any time to the judges. No judge evaluated a proposal from a

student at their same institution and the chair was not notified of any other conflicts of interest. In order to implement the policy that priority would be given to first-time entrants, students who had received a Pollitzer award previously had 1.5 points deducted from their final score.

AABA had funds to award 30 awards (but two of the individuals attending virtually so we actually had 31 winners!). The winners are listed below.
